Speaker: Seth Shostak, SETI Institute, N6UDK

Summary: Dr. Shostak updates us on the latest developments in the Search for Extraterrestrial Intelligence.

Seth Shostak, N6UDK, has a B.A. in physics from Princeton and a Ph.D. in astronomy from Caltech. He did research in radio astronomy at several observatories before joining SETI. He has published numerous articles in professional journals as well as a number of popular magazines. He is the host of the SETI Institute's weekly radio program on science. He is also responsible for many outreach activities for the SETI Institute.

An Informal History of FARS de Paul Zander AA6PZ

The recent passing of Stan Kuhl, K6MA, marked the end of the "first generation" of FARS members. For the benefit of the newer members of the club, I will off a brief summary of some of the old club members.

I moved here in the fall of 1970. With some plan ahead and use of the college ham station, I made various HF contacts with the Bay Area. Within a few days, I had a landline call with Jerry Starkey, K6LIJ inviting me to a club meeting. He and George Raven, K6OG picked me up. Good thing because I barely knew how to get from Mountain View to Palo Alto in the daytime. Jerry had a degree in mechanical engineering. For many years, he maintained the club storage yard for antennas and towers and was really helpful in how to put them up, how take them down and various ways to hold things together.

K6 "Old George", had a unique function at the annual Field Day's. He never operated, but he always showed up on Sunday morning. When everyone else was tired, he made short work rolling up all of the coax cables, power cords and guy wires. George also knew everything there was to know about repairing antenna rotors. If your antenna wouldn't turn, George could either fix it or tell you how to fix it yourself.

As speaker at a club meeting, George told about his work with Bechtel and the Bolivian government to build a new copper mine, and smelter connect by a railroad. Ironically they had to pay a high price for copper to build the project and by the time it was finished, the world price for copper had plummeted. With the recent skyrocketing of copper prices, I hope the project is finally a financial success.

The 1984 Olympic Games used Stanford University for some of the soccer games. We had a special events station at the Red Cross with the phonetics, Kilo-six-Olympic Games.

Jim Lomasney, WA6NIL, was a soft spoken fellow, but he published a number of articles in QST. He also had an endless supply of jokes that were so dumb you had to laugh.

Sy Stein, WA6ROM, was a medical doctor with NASA. I still remember his banquet presentation, "The Other Side of the Moon." He described many things invented for the space program that had down to earth applications, for example, dental fillings.

Bob Stein, W6NBI, often seemed a bit argumentative, but his intent was to provoke some real brain activity. Last December, I went to the estate sale at his house. In a workroom off the garage, a portion of one wall was covered with certificates from the FARS home brew contest, including many for first place. He also left a large collection of electronic parts neatly sorted into cigar boxes. I am sure Bob enjoyed the original contents of the boxes as much as the parts he stored in them. Bob published a number of technical articles in Ham Radio Magazine.

Bill Robinson, WB6OML, was one of the many Field Day activists. Many years, Bill and I set up the station for 15 / 40 meters SSB. (We let the serious contesters have 20 meters.) One year there was an unofficial contest to build the biggest 40 meter antenna. Before there was EZNEC, I used a computer program to design a 4 element Yagi. Bill figured out how to stand up two 50-foot push up "TV" masts with a 16-foot "boom" at the top of each. Each end of the booms held up the middle of an inverted VEE. Not to be outdone, Dick, N6ATD, designed a 5 element

log-periodic also supported by several push-up masts for the Novice station.

That same year, Walt Reed, W6ASH, designed and built a full size, cubical quad antenna for 40 meters. Walt worked at Rantron and made the arrangements for the club to have Field Day at the place above Crystal Springs Reservoir.

Walt was the prime mover behind emergency preparedness. He lent me my first 2 meter rig. It was portable, approximately a 1 ft cube, with a carrying handle on the top and a Civil Defense sticker on the side. It required 120 Volt power; used AM; and could only operate on the frequency of the crystal plugged into the front panel. By today's standards, it might seem awkward or even primitive. However, every Monday evening at 8:00 PM local time, there was Walt calling the SPECS net. In the 1960's, Walt was net controller for the world-wide net supporting Project Oscar.

Stan K6MA, was a serious DX-er. For years and years, he worked virtually every DX-pedition and had contacts with almost every country on the DXCC list. The few missing entities either had absolutely no ham activity, or had just been added to the list.

At the annual FD, we always counted on Walt and Stan as the stalwart CW operators. Some years FARS had 2 CW stations; some years FARS only had one station with Stan and Walt teaming up. Either way, visitors were always welcome. Even while making contacts at 2 or sometimes 3 a minute, they would also talk with the other hams in the shack. If you lingered more than a few minutes, you would find yourself in a chair and copying from their notepads into the official log book. Those were the days when all ham licenses had a Morse code requirement. Even if you had actively ignored code once you had your ticket, you soon found the rapid bursts of dots and dashes starting to form letters in your head. The keyer was actually sending CQ and K6YA. Before long, under the guidance of Walt or Stan, you might find yourself sending, and even copying the call signs of the other stations.

These are just some of the many club members who got FARS off to a good start. Here are some other bits of club history.

I was told that the club originally wanted to be named Mountain View ARC. However a group in SoCal had already picked that name. There was also the unofficial name of Foothill Amateur Radio Technical Society, which I will not abbreviate. Guest speakers were always welcomed and treated with respect, but there was no mercy if the presentation had technical errors.

I have seen pictures of some early Field Days near Moody Road where there is now a Junior College. In 1970, FD was on a knoll off Summerhill Road. Today there is a house that looks down on El Monte. There were several years at the fog-swept Rantron site, alternating with the warm field at Maryknoll. The club has also operated from Mountain View Shoreline Park, and a few other places. There is nothing cast in stone, but there is a strong preference for Maryknoll, both because we can get permission to do what we want as well as it being convenient to get to..

Well the FARS club has seen a lot of changes over the years. Solid state equipment, major changes to the FCC license testing, more interest in VHF and emergency preparedness, less interest in 40 meters and chasing DX. The meetings have changed to different days of the week, and moved to various locations. Just the same, a lot of hams show up for a combination of social interaction, learning new things, and planning future activities. The future of the club looks as bright as it ever was.





FARS/PAARA Winter Banquet FRIDAY 23 January 2009 Michael's at Shoreline

The easiest way to find Michael's is to take highway 101 to Mountain View. Exit onto Shoreline Blvd. (aka Stierlin Road) north (towards the bay). Follow for about 1 mile until you reach the gate for Shoreline Park. Alternatively, you can exit onto Amphitheatre Parkway from 101 and follow it north/east (towards the bay) to Shoreline Blvd. Turn left (north) onto Shoreline and follow until you reach the gate for Shoreline Park.

Enter the park through the gate, which will be open. Follow the road $(\sim 3/4 \text{ mi.})$ in a wide left curve around the park. Look for a sign pointing left for Michael's. Take a left turn and enter the Parking lot. The building next to the parking lot is Michael's.

TALK-IN via the <u>N6NFI</u> (145.230-; 100Hz PL) repeater or the <u>W6ASH</u> 145.27- (100Hz PL) repeater.
