Topic: "Predicting HF Ionospheric Propagation by Ray Tracing"



Did you hear Steve talk about using VOACAP to predict HF propagation paths at FARS February 2010? This is the sequel.

Ionospheric ray tracing is a method entirely different from VOACAP for predicting HF propagation. In many cases, ray tracing gives better insight into propagation effects than VOACAP. Steve will explain why and show real time examples using a program called Proplab-Pro 3.0, which is priced within reach of the serious DX'er. Steve will show what it can do that VOACAP can't. He will talk about the limits and future

of both approaches to the problem of prediction.

Jim WU0I shared his ham radio experiences in Ethiopia.





Speaker: Jim Deloach, WU0I *United States Foreign Service*

Topic: "Amateur Radio in Ethiopia"

Have you ever wanted to be that rare DX station and be on the other end of the pile-ups? Have you ever wondered what it would be like to be in a country where you can count the number of amateur radio operators on your fingers and toes, instead of being yet another Silicon Valley Ham? We heard Jim DeLoach, a United States Foreign Service Officer recently returned from Addis Ababa, talk about Amateur Radio in Ethiopia! Ethiopia should be Ham Radio paradise, but shipping and import constraints, high noise levels in this crowded third world city, and most importantly suspicious and unmotivated local officials make hamming a challenge. We learned how Jim overcame these obstacles, what it was like to be that rare DX station for a change, and how the Ethiopian Amateur Radio Society (EARS) club station, ET3AA, and its founder Sid, ET3SID, have played a critical role in keeping Ethiopia on the air!

CQP & improving your operating skills

From an operating point of view, what do Public Service, chasing DX or working contests have in common?



They all require accurate copy of information under stress – whether the stress of the moment, the adrenaline rush of rare DX or contest pile up, you have to accurately copy and relay information.

Entering a contest either casually to give some points or as a serious effort, Contesting provides a great learning experience for information copy "under fire".

The first weekend of October (October 1st & 2nd this year) sees the annual running of the California QSO Party – a great opportunity for stations in California because everyone else HAS TO WORK US!

** We are the DX! **


Whether you are a "big gun" with stacked yagis and 1500 watts, or a "little pistol" with 100 watts to a vertical or a wire antenna, everyone else in the world wants to work YOU to pick up one of the 58 counties in our state.

It's a lot of fun being on the receiving end of a pile up or searching & pouncing for other states and countries.

For California stations the object of the contest is to work as many stations as possible on SSB and CW. You can work the same station on each band and each mode for score credit. Every US state and Canadian province you work counts as a multiplier – 58 total for us just like the number of counties in California.

Want to be really on the end of a pile up? Plan a "CApedition" to one of the rarer counties in California and the rest of the world will beat a path to your front end!

Low Power, High Power? CW or SSB? CQP is a fun contest for all.



The last 10 years has seen a great increase in the number of logs submitted from the US, the DX world and (of course!) from California.

Last year we received just over 900 logs and with 2011 being the 45th Anniversary of CQP, we are making a big drive to get well over 1000 logs submitted.

CQP is sponsored by the Northern California Contest Club led by the NCCC "Green" team chaired by Rick "The Rhino" N6RNO as CQP Contest Chairman. A group of NCCC volunteers help with PR, planning county expeditions and processing all the logs to score the contest.

Every station that submits a log is eligible for an achievement certificate and there are several operating categories where the leader receives a wooden CQP plaque for proud display on the shack wall.

Three categories are designed to encourage operation in contests:


- YL award
- Youth (< 18) award
- New Contester's Award starting this year, this category is open to any operator that submits a log with at least 100 QSOs, made using either TriBander, Wire or Vertical antennas AND who have never submitted a log in any contest with more than 100 QSOs. So if you've never entered a contest or have only dabbled in the past, this award category is for you!

In addition to the above CQP-specific awards is the WACC award offered year-round:

• Worked All California Counties Award – If you work all 58 counties you qualify for this award sponsored by NCCC. All 58 counties do not have to be contacted during this same contest weekend, but it's a excellent opportunity to get them all! See www.nccc.cc/wacc.





All counties will be on the air!

Part time or full, home operator or an expedition to a new county, CQP is a blast!



Smiley Face on the Sun? New Video Shows All

Our sun is apparently a happy star according to the latest video from a NASA observatory. The video shows a pattern of sunspots that, when viewed from afar, forms a vast happy face smiling across face of the sun.

Sunspots are darker, cooler patches on the sun caused when intense magnetic activity blocks heat convection. These spots are normal, but they don't usually align to give the sun's face such character.

The smile on the sun is visible through 11 photographs taken by NASA's Solar Dynamics Observatory, which images the sun from Earth orbit. Each picture was taken at the same time, but through a different filter that separated out a narrow wavelength band of light. The images range from lowest temperature to highest.


RTTY was held August 21st and Rookies from across the country participated.

What is RTTY?

RTTY, also known as Radioteletype, allows communication using two radios and a modulation technique such as frequency shift keying (FSK). Many ham radio operators enjoy using modern PCs and soundcard software or TNCs to take advantage of this fun mode.

How to get to FARS meetings (Visitors are always welcome)

DIRECTIONS:

Go about 1/10th of a mile. Turn left into the parking lot. The gym is the tall building to your right with red and white stripes.

From US101 or El Camino: take San Antonio Road west (to Foothill Expressway). Then follow directions above at point (A).
